Gillespie To Run Bus Line On Road 24 To State Line

Indianapolis, June 23 (AP)—The Public Service Commission, holding its regular weekly session today postponed from last Friday, issued a large number of orders, including the following:

Authorizing D. A. Gillespie of Logansport to operate a bus line interstate only between Logansport and the Illinois state line, passing through Monticello, Reynolds, Goodland and Kentland.

The commission also authorized the John's Buss company of LaPorte to transfer a certificate of public convenience for a bus line between Logansport and Winamac to Willis L. Birch and Fred Sheppard of Hammond. The permit had been directed to be transferred at first to James Boniface but he did not follow the directions of the decision, it was alleged.
